STRATEGIC PLAN

By 2017, Onesimo Bulilit has;

1 Maintained and continually developed residential care for abused and abandoned children.

We are striving to provide even better care to the children in our residential center, by enhancing the skills of our staff and by further developing our infrastructure. We are planning additional dorms for our young teens, in order to separate the accommodation of the 12-15 years old from 4-11 years old children. In order to continue providing quality care to the children, we also want to recruit and train an additional married couple as house parents. We also plan to enhance our psychological services by employing a psychologist with a focus on assessment and therapy.

2 Facilitated the transition of children in residential care to alternative parental care or independent living.

If children cannot be reintegrated with their families or relatives, we plan to place them in adoptive or foster families. We continue to operate a group home for our oldest teens, where they learn to head their own household, while still being in a safe environment and being supported for their schooling.

3 Maintained and continually developed community based programs for children at risk and their families.

In Quiapo and Tondo we want to develop decentralized community-based programs that are responsive to the needs of the children and empowering to their families. In the next 2-3 years we hope to develop livelihood initiatives together with the parents; we also plan to offer alternative education to them. In Tondo we implement promising practices we developed in Quiapo, such as the Development Center and Educational Assistance. In the fifth year, we are hoping to expand our programs to a new area in Manila.

4 Developed child rights advocates and young leaders who are active agents of transformation in their families, schools, and community.

We plan to further develop our leadership training and advocacy program, involving teens from our different programs. Training shall include personality development, spiritual formation, leadership training, advocacy training, creative arts, and outdoor activities. We also want to gain a deeper understanding of the street young culture in order to be able to address issues our young people are facing.

5 Supported children at risk within their families, and all effort made to empower and equip the families to care for their own children.

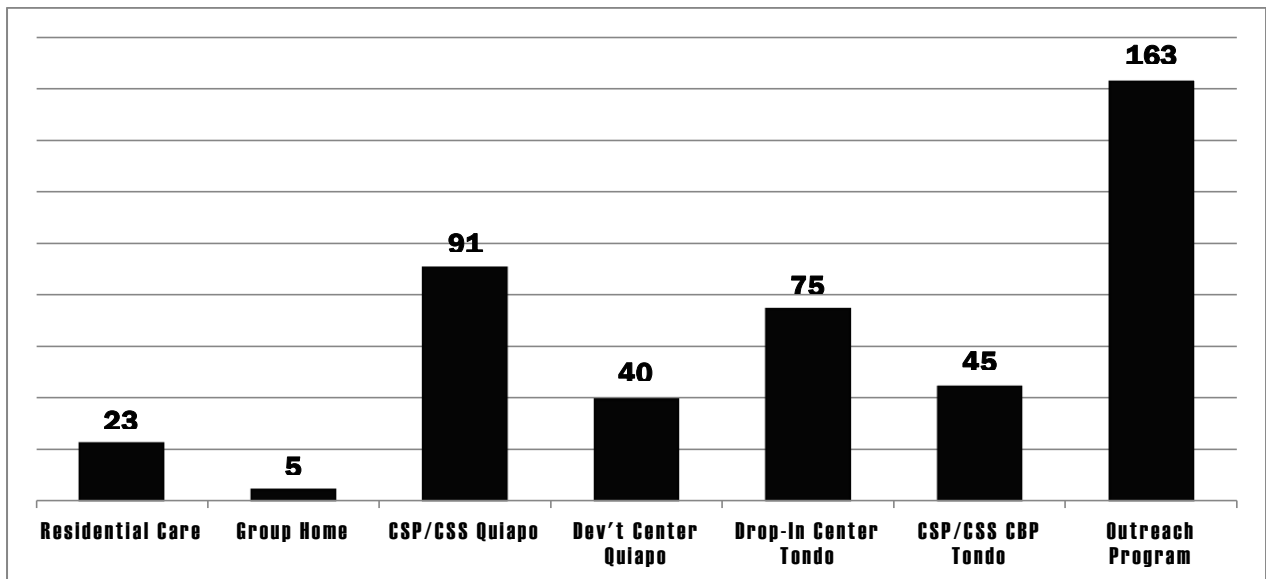
We believe that it is crucial to view and understand the child in the context of the family and community. Thus, we are planning to further enhance family enrichment activities with parents from all programs, such as parents' meetings, parents' retreats, family days, home visits, and counselling.

6 Created systems for resource development

Within the next five years, we plan to diversify our fund sources and to develop local donors, in order to ensure the sustainability of our programs. We also want to continually develop our staff in order to enhance their skills and stay up to date with current trends. We also intentionally recruit and develop volunteers

We are thankful to God for what have accomplished from June 2013 to May 2014 with the help of donors, sponsors, staff and volunteers.

Onesimo Bulilit has served a total of **279 Neglected, Abandoned, Abused and Street Children and their families** through regular programs and **additional 163 children** through the Outreach Program.

In October and November, a **Family Retreat with 89 families and a total of 442 participants** was successfully conducted in Project Jabez Campsite, Dasmariñas Cavite.

Three (3) Summer Camps at Camp Rock in Mindoro were attended by **93 children** and **36 leaders and junior leaders**.

On May 5, 2014, OBFi received its new **Registration Certificate** and **License to Operate** from DSWD.

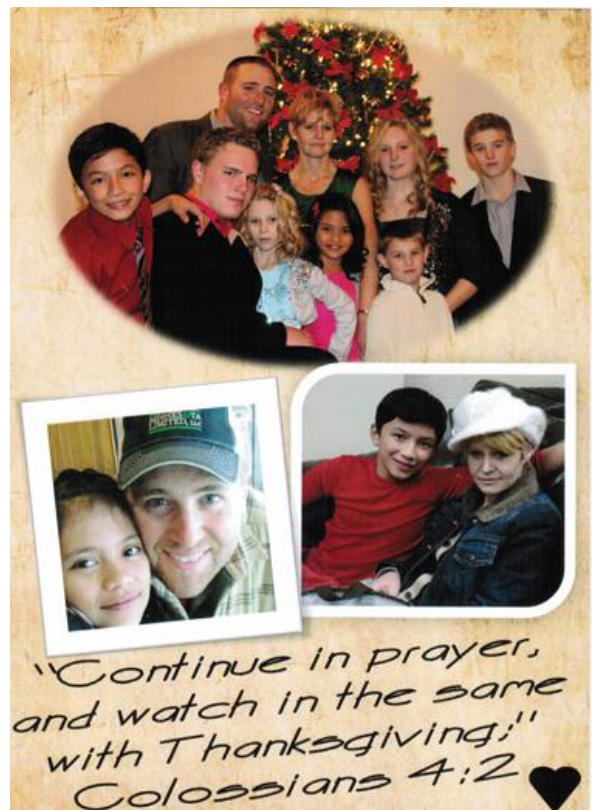
A **newly set-up Student Center** next to the existing Drop-In Center at Moriones Street, Tondo, was inaugurated in July 2013 and **supported 45 children** in their formal schooling.

RESIDENTIAL CARE

Children (4-12 years old) in need of temporary shelter, nurture, attention and special protection from abuse and neglect are admitted to residential care. While in the shelter, the children experience a home-like atmosphere, are sent to school, learn adaptive life skills, and grow in an environment that provides positive experiences and opportunities for their growth and development.

- Twenty three (23) abandoned, neglected and abused children were served by the Residential Center.
- Four (4) new children were admitted for shelter, nurture and care.
- Three (3) children were reconciled to their families, while one (1) child was transferred to the Group home.
- Four (4) children (boys) have been declared abandoned by DSWD. Certificates of Legal Availability for Adoption were issued to Onesimo Bulilit.
- Two (2) siblings participated in the Winter Hosting Program of the Inter-Country Adoption Board (ICAB) last December 16, 2013 - January 17, 2014 in Ohio Texas, USA, in preparation for their planned adoption.

- Two (2) children graduated from Elementary School last March 25, 2014.
- Three (3) children received academic awards.
- Improved the playground, isolation room and bedrooms of the children for their safety and welfare.
- ADB Personnel hosted a Christmas party and gift-giving with Shelter kids last Nov. 29, 2013.
- Received in-kinds and cash donations from ADB, ACCAP, DSLU and Gardenia Bakeries for the children.
- Various activities were conducted such as life-book making, kids outing, summer activities, interest club, vacation camp, Christmas party, one-on-one talks, child-to-child health education sessions, counseling, school visits, home visits and tutorials.



STORIES OF TRANSFORMATION

ARIEN (14) was nine years old when he and his younger sister were admitted to the residential center because their mother was in jail. He was a lively boy but often other children complained that he was bossy and that he bullied them. When he was confronted and reprimanded by the staff he was not able to admit his mistakes and often answered back. But his care givers never gave up helping him improve his aggressive behaviors. Despite of that, Arien performed well in school and obtained good grades. After one year, his mother decided to legally surrender the siblings, since she did not have a job or a house, and she went in and out of jail due to drug trafficking. The possibility of an adoption was discussed to Arien and his sister. Arien was torn between his dream of a better future and his attachment to his mother. The processing of their adoption took a long time, and Arien often felt disappointed and lost hope to find an adoptive family. But he continued to pray that a family would be found for them. Finally in 2013 he and his sister were able to join the Winter Hosting Program in the USA to meet their possible adoptive family. Their host family showed much love and care for them and decided to adopt the siblings. They are excited and want the two siblings to be part of their family as soon as possible. After that event Arien changed a lot. He became more respectful to adults, more loving and caring to his sister, and more patient and understanding toward the younger children in the center. He has been given a role as a “kuya” (older brother) for the younger children, and he has become a responsible teenager. He treasures his time with his future adoptive family and says that he has learned many things: “It feels good to have a complete family and a real house to live in. Only now I have experienced this. I can see myself in the children in the center who hurt and bully others. I don’t like to see that thus I try to be more patient now. I am thankful to Onesimo Bulilit because my dream has been fulfilled.” Arien is still praying for the fast processing of their adoption, which should happen soon now.



NINA (12) was found on the street when she was 8 years old. She was sick and very weak, and was referred to us by the social welfare. During her first few days in the center, she was very timid and almost didn’t talk. However, within a few weeks she adjusted to the new environment. She began to smile, looked more healthy and strong, and she found another girl as her best friend. Nina was always kind and respectful to adults. When she committed mistakes, she would just cry and then write a letter to say “sorry”. Throughout her stay in the center, she always dreamed to be reunited to her family. After a few months, we were able to locate her family. After that she was more hopeful that she could return to her mother. But her mother didn’t show any effort to show concern for the child and never visited her in the center. The social worker continued to stay in touch with the mother, until she decided to take back her child, even though she admitted that she may not be able to provide the child a better future because she had no permanent home or job. During the following summer, Nina was given a chance to spend her vacation with her mother in preparation for the reintegration. Sadly her experience with her mother was difficult and she decided that she wanted to continue staying in the center. Then her father died due to a car accident, and Nina was very sad. Still she longed to be reunited to her family, but her mother continued to disappoint her and did not keep her promises. Finally, she decided to be reunited with her grandmother in the province, where she was born. Her grandmother admitted that she could not assure a better future for Nina, but she believes that God will provide for them. Nina promised that she would help her grandmother. On the day she left the center, Nina had mixed emotions. She was happy because finally she would be with her family again but sad because she would miss her friends and care givers in the center. She is also worried about the adjustment to her new environment. Nina did not long for a comfortable life, but it was more important for her to be with her real family so that she could meet her mother anytime.

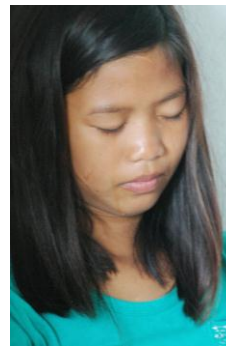
GROUP HOME FOR INDEPENDENT LIVING

The group home is a separate house hold for teenage girls ages 15-18 years old whose stay in the residential center is likely to be prolonged due to the unreadiness of their parents or guardians to take care of them, and due to the inability to place them in alternative permanent homes.

- The program was able to serve five (5) children; all girls.
- One (1) child was enrolled in high school last June 2013.
- One (1) child graduated from Elementary School last March 2014.

- One (1) girl, 14 years old, was reintegrated to her family due to lack of interest and difficulty to pursue her studies despite all efforts made and support given by the staff.
- Three (3) girls underwent annual dental check-up.

Various activities were conducted such as outings, swimming, Mallng, Christmas party, participation in the family retreat, school visits, one-on-one talks, and group meetings.



COMMUNITY-BASED PROGRAM TONDO

DROP-IN CENTER

Street children (6-14 years old), after being reached out in the streets, find a safe place, a refuge, and an open ear in the Drop-in Center. While at the center, the children are provided with meals and snacks, their values and behaviours are addressed through various workshops and activities, and they learn basic literacy skills. Also, their situation is being assessed and appropriate interventions are given.

This year, the center has served seventy five (75) children (23 regular and 52 irregular clients).



DEVELOPMENT CENTER

The twenty three (23) children were served by the Development Center. Out of 23, only twenty (20) children graduated last March 30, 2014 and enrolled in Grade 1.



STORY OF TRANSFORMATION



JENNIFER

"Hello, I am Jennifer and I am 10 years old. Because of Onesimo Bulilit I can go to school, I learned to read and write, and I learned good behavior through the leaders and volunteers. The staff let us feel how much they love us and they give us importance and value us. Formerly, I was not able to control my anger and I often threw tantrums when I didn't get what I wanted. I just got angry so quickly and I often had fights with other children at the center and would hurt them. I also cursed them if I did not like what they did to me. I used to answer back to adults. When I joined Onesimo Bulilit, many things changed in my behavior. I began to learn how to control my anger because of the counseling sessions and the ongoing conversation with the staff. They love us, we can feel that. They teach us, and especially during sharing times I can feel relief of my negative emotions. During devotions I got to know God better. Thank you for choosing me to be supported in my studies!"

COMMUNITY-BASED PROGRAM TONDO

CHILD SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM AND SUPPORT SERVICE

The Child Sponsorship Program (CSP) supports street children (7-18 years old) in their formal schooling, develops their potential and helps them to reach their dreams. Their educational needs such as school supplies, uniforms, and allowances have been provided. The Student Center has offers a safe and friendly environment for tutorials, skills enhancement and empowerment. The parents are encouraged to participate in the program and are supported in their child rearing responsibilities.

- Ten (10) students were served through the Child Sponsorship Program, supporting them for their formal schooling. Out of 10, five (5) students received academic awards and recognitions.
- Thirty Five (35) children were served by the Support Service, providing basic support for their schooling. Out of 35, five (5) students received recognition and honor.
- A new Student Center offering a safe space, support, meals, tutorials, and a learning environment to the students was set-up and opened in July 2013 at Moriones Street, Tondo, Manila, next to the existing Drop-in Center.
- Various activities were conducted such as tutorials, summer activities, kids and family outing, family day, educational fieldtrip, one-on-one talks, school visits, home visits and parent meetings.



STORY OF TRANSFORMATION

ABIGAIL

"I am Abigail and I am 16 years old now. My hobbies are singing, dancing, and drawing. My negative experiences while living on the street include being bullied and being molested. I also experienced being physically maltreated by my parents. But my life has changed since I became part of Onesimo Bulilit two years ago. Many things have changed in my behavior. Before, I got angry quickly, was always ill-tempered, shouted a lot, and was not able to accept my mistakes. But now I have learned not to fight back and am able to accept when I am wrong. I also learned to speak with a lower voice. I am happy because we have many activities such as outings, sharing times, devotion, and teens club. I made so many experiences I will never forget, such as the family retreat. Before Onesimo Bulilit arrived we did not experience such things. I am happy because we have learned to express our feelings. We are being formed by the staff so that our bad behavior changes. Thank you so much to all who are supporting us, if not because of you, we would not have come to where we are now. But now we are moving on from our difficult circumstances. We are being taught how to know God, and we are reminded that we are valuable children. All the children's rights are being taught to us. That's why I want to thank all those people helping us, without them we would not be able to reach our dreams."

COMMUNITY-BASED PROGRAM TONDO

Other Activities

- A total of eighty seven (87) participants with eleven (11) from Drop-in and nine (9) families from Child Sponsorship Program and attended the Family retreat held in November 2013 in Dasmarinas, Cavite.
- Facilitated an annual medical check-up of 58 children, and an annual dental check-up of 30 children from drop-in and sponsorship program.
- A total of 174 children from different programs were reached out during the Christmas season.



COMMUNITY-BASED PROGRAM TONDO

STREET EDUCATION

- A total of 163 street children were served through outreach program in Tondo and Divisoria. The following advocacy workshop and activities were facilitated by the team: Children's Rights, Child Sexual Abuse Prevention, Reproductive Health, Vices and Substance Abuse, Anti-Corporal Punishment and Online Safety.



COMMUNITY-BASED PROGRAM QUIAPO

CHILD SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM AND SUPPORT SERVICE

The Child Sponsorship Program (CSP) supports street children (7-18 years old) in their formal schooling, develops their potential and helps them to reach their dreams. Their educational needs such as school supplies, uniforms, and allowances have been provided. The Student Center has offers a safe and friendly environment for tutorials, skills enhancement and empowerment. The parents are encouraged to participate in the program and are supported in their child rearing responsibilities.

- The Child Sponsorship program has served seventy (71) students. Out of 71, only sixty four (64) students promoted to the next school year 2014. Twenty four (24) students received academic awards and recognitions.
- Twenty (20) students served by Support Service, providing basic support for their schooling. Only fourteen (14) finished the school year. Out of 14, eleven (11) students received academic awards and recognitions.
- Conducted (2) general assemblies for children under CSP and Support Service.
- Forty five (45) families with a total of one hundred eighty (180) participants attended the Family Retreat held on Nov. 9-12, 2014 at Dasmarinas, Cavite.
- One hundred five (105) kids and teens, and fifty (50) parents were reached-out last Christmas season. The participants had fun and enjoyed the party; and they were very thankful for the gifts and food they received during the activity.
- Various activities were conducted such as tutorials, kids outing, educational fieldtrip, kids and teens workshops, one-on-one talks, school visits, home visits and parents meetings.
- Facilitated (2) leadership development workshops for 35 participants with the topics "Improving Study Habit" and "I Think I'm in Love".

STORY OF TRANSFORMATION

"When I was not yet part of Onesimo Bulilit I had to walk to school. But since I now receive some allowance, I can ride a Jeep. Many things have changed with me. First I was part of the Support Service, but since I performed well in school I was included in the Child Sponsorship Program. I am happy because the program has helped me a lot. My parents do not have difficulties anymore to get the money for my school needs because Onesimo Bulilit helps them with the expenses. I also enjoyed going to Mindoro to a camp. I got to know many people and we were able to swim in the sea. I learned many things and enjoyed the company of the children of other programs. I am thankful to Onesimo Bulilit for all their support. If it was not for them, I would not be in High School now. I want to reach my dream and I know they help me towards that. Thank you very much!"

COMMUNITY-BASED PROGRAM QUIAPO

DEVELOPMENT CENTER

The Development Center provides three hours of classroom instruction, preparing deprived children emotionally and academically for formal schooling. The program targets children from 6-9 years old who have not yet been to school and aims at improving self-confidence and behaviour, and teaching basic reading, writing and counting skills. The curriculum integrates academics, values and behaviour, and lessons from the Child-to-Child Promotion Program.

- The center has served a total of forty (40) children. Out of 40, thirty four (34) students graduated last April 3, 2014 and were enrolled in Grade 1.
- Twenty three (23) families with a total of ninety (90) participants attended the Family Retreat held in October 2014 at Dasmarinas, Cavite.
- Various activities were conducted such as kids outing, educational fieldtrip, one-on-one talks, home visits, Christmas parties with kids and parents, and parents meetings.



STORY OF TRANSFORMATION

MALEN* is an 8 year old girl who lives under the Quezon Boulevard Bridge in Quiapo. She had never attended school because her parents could not afford to support the schooling. Her mother sells rice pastries and sometimes fetches water to sell. Malen has many siblings and the family is short with their basic needs. Before Malen entered the Development Center, she couldn't read nor write. She was reserved, shy, and showed a low self-esteem. Because of the scabies all over her body she was often teased by other children, making her cry easily. While in class, she paid attention to our discussions and was able to focus on what she did. She was a fast learner, and performing on stage added confidence to her. She was awarded as the most attentive and best in reading and writing at the end of the year. Before she always brought junk food and soft drinks to school. Her teacher discussed the matter with her mother and advised her not to bring unhealthy food and also to watch her language. After that, Malen didn't bring any more junk food and soft drinks. She also always washed her hands before eating. She has become respectful to her teachers and the lessons of the child-to-child health promotion program played a big role in the change and growth of Malen.

COMMUNITY-BASED PROGRAM QUIAPO

CRISIS INTERVENTION



The Crisis intervention service has served thirty (35) walk-in clients. Each client was given an appropriate intervention/assistance after assessment done by the social worker



and staff, such as medical assistance (25), burial assistance (9), and transportation to the province (1).



SPECIAL EVENTS

FAMILY RETREAT & COUPLES DINNER NIGHT



A total of **442 participants with 89 families** attended the **Family Retreat** with the theme “Ang Pamilyang Masagana...Masaya at Nagkakaisa”. The retreat was successfully conducted on 23-26 of October 2013 for Batch 1, and 9-12 of November 2013 for Batch 2 at Jabez Campsite, Dasmariñas, Cavite.

Also, the retreat has received 450 loaves of Gardenia Breads from Gardenia Bakeries, and a cash donation from Manila North Toll ways Corporation (MNTC).

A post valentine **Couples Dinner Night** was held on February 22, 2014 with a theme of “Ikaw Lamang...Magpakailanman” with a **total of 38 participants and 14 Couples**.

STORIES OF TRANSFORMATION

"I am thankful to Onesimo Bulilit because my child was able to complete the Development Center and is now part of the Child Support Program. Onesimo Bulilit contributed much to the change in our family, not only through the financial support for the schooling of my children. That's why now I give effort in helping out in the student center, in order to show my thankfulness to the staff. What I like about the programs of Onesimo Bulilit are the tutorials. Because of that the children really learn a lot and they are being guided by their teachers. I am proud now since my child belongs to the top of her class, all because of their patient teaching. I want to thank the staff and teachers of Onesimo Bulilit with all my heart and most of all the Lord. My one dream for my children is that they give their best in school and that they will be able to finish school and find a good job one day. And for Onesimo Bulilit, that it will grow further and be able to help many more children."

MARIFE lives with her three children on the sidewalk in Quiapo. Her husband is in jail. Two of her children became part of the Child Sponsorship program, but for three years our experience with her was not good. She was not supportive of the academics, hygiene, and emotional needs of her children. She also did not come to the parents meetings and to other events of Onesimo Bulilit. But this year suddenly she began to change. We gave her another chance by accepting her youngest child at the Development Center. Her rapport with the teacher improved. She always brought the child to school and always attended meetings and participated. She also fulfilled her cleaning duties in the center. She was willing to accept comments regarding the attitude and behavior of her child, and instead of getting angry she supported and encouraged him. Thus, during the graduation ceremony she received an award as "committed and industrious parent". Even though her child could not be recommended for Grade 1 since he was not yet ready, she still enrolled him since he was already able to read and write. She applied him for the Support Service, and he was accepted because of her participation in the Development Center. Today she is still very supportive of her child, brings him to school and to the student center every day. She is also diligent in helping with cleaning at the Student Center and has good relationships with other parents and staff.

SPECIAL EVENTS

VACATION CAMP, BULILIT CAMP LEVEL 1 & LEADERSHIP CAMP

The **Summer Camps** were conducted from May 12-17, 2014 for Camp Level 1, and May 19-24, 2014 for Leadership Camp and Shelter Vacation Camp with a total of 93 campers and 36 leaders and junior leaders from its various programs and centers.



The **Camp Level 1** has served 46 Street children, ages 5 to 14 years old from the community in Tondo, Manila with the theme: "Hero ko si God...Sidekick Niya Ako."



This year, the **Leadership Camp** with a theme, "Plugged-In" was participated by 32 teen-agers ages 12 to 18 years old.



The **Shelter Vacation Camp** was enjoyed by 15 residents with the theme: "Binago Ako ni Hesus."



ORGANIZATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

- **Sixty (60) Children and twenty five (25) Staff and Volunteers** have enjoyed the free entrance and swimming at Splash Island Resort last June 14, 2013.
- On May 31, 2014, Onesimo Bulilit team together with the children and some parents have gathered for a simple **thanksgiving celebration** as well as to award the winner of "Huwarang Center" for fiscal year 2013-14, which was awarded after thorough evaluation and deliberation to the Community-Based Program Quiapo.
